## From the Principal's Desk...

#### Embracing Unity

I have long held to the adage that Christian schools are a small window into the unity we as believers will experience in heaven. In a world filled with diverse beliefs and practices, Christian schools serve as a sanctuary where students from various denominations come together, united by a shared faith in Christ. The hope is that Listowel Christian School fosters not only academic excellence but also emphasizes the importance of understanding and appreciating our differences while remaining anchored in our common beliefs.

#### The Legacy of Reformation

The Reformation, which began in the 16th century, was a pivotal movement that sought to address various theological discrepancies within the Church. Figures like Martin Luther and John Calvin emphasized the authority of Scripture, grace through faith, and the priesthood of all believers. While the Reformation led to the formation of various denominations, it also reinforced the idea that believers can hold differing views yet still belong to the broader Christian community.

In today's Christian schools, this spirit of the Reformation continues. Students are encouraged to explore and discuss the nuances of their faith, understanding that these differences enrich the community rather than divide it. This environment of open dialogue promotes a culture of respect and unity, where students learn to appreciate diverse perspectives.

#### Halloween: A Case Study in Differences

One area where Christian perspectives often diverge is in the celebration of Halloween. Some Christian families embrace the holiday as a time for community engagement, creativity, and fun. #### Finding Common Ground

As the Halloween season approaches, many Christians find themselves grappling with whether to participate in the festivities. Here are some traditional arguments for and against celebrating Halloween from a Christian perspective.

#### Arguments For Supporting Halloween

- 1. **Community Engagement:** Halloween can serve as an opportunity for community building. Many churches host fall festivals, trunk-or-treat events, or harvest celebrations that promote fellowship and outreach in a safe environment.
- Creativity and Fun: Celebrating Halloween allows families to engage in creative activities like costume design and pumpkin carving. These can be enjoyable, wholesome ways for families to bond and express themselves.
- 3. **Cultural Relevance:** Participating in Halloween can provide an entry point for discussions about cultural traditions. Understanding and engaging with societal customs can help Christians navigate the world while maintaining their faith.
- 4. Witnessing Opportunities: Halloween can present unique opportunities for evangelism. By welcoming neighbors into their homes and sharing treats or inviting them to church events, Christians can build relationships and share their faith in a non-confrontational way.
- 5. Focus on Positive Values: Some Christians choose to focus on themes of light overcoming darkness, using Halloween as a time to reflect on Christ as the Light of the World, rather than the darker aspects of the holiday.

#### Arguments Against Supporting Halloween

- 1. Pagan Origins: Critics often cite Halloween's roots in pagan traditions and practices as a reason to avoid the holiday. They argue that participating in Halloween can be seen as endorsing or trivializing these origins.
- 2. Emphasis on Fear and Darkness: Many Halloween traditions, such as horror movies and spooky decorations, can promote themes of fear, violence, and death. Some Christians believe that engaging with these elements contradicts their faith's call to focus on life, hope, and positivity.
- 3. Confusion for Children: Some parents worry that celebrating Halloween may send mixed messages to children about the nature of good and evil. They fear that enjoying Halloween could blur the lines of biblical teachings and moral values.
- 4. Cultural Sensitivity: For some, the celebration can be seen as insensitive to those who have experienced real trauma related to themes of death or the occult. Christians may feel it's more compassionate to refrain from celebrations that could be painful for others.
- 5. Alternatives Exist: Many argue that there are plenty of other ways to celebrate fall or harvest themes without participating in Halloween. Activities such as community service, church gatherings, or family outings can provide fulfilling alternatives.

#### Conclusion

The decision to support or abstain from Halloween is deeply personal and often influenced by individual beliefs, family traditions, and community dynamics. In Christian schools, these conversations can foster a spirit of understanding, allowing students to explore and articulate their views respectfully. Ultimately, whether one chooses to celebrate Halloween or not, the key is to engage thoughtfully and maintain a focus on love, respect, and unity within the body of Christ.

As a child I went out for Halloween but by the time my younger brother was able to go trick or treating, my parents were convicted to no longer mark the event. When my husband and I were raising our children, we made the choice to abstain from celebrating Halloween. We often rented ice at the local arena and invited other families to join us.

Ultimately, whether a family chooses to celebrate Halloween or not, we want to focus on what unites us—our faith in Jesus Christ— and help students learn to navigate their differences in a spirit of grace and understanding.





# Grade 2

### <u>Grade 2 - Mrs. Grundlingh:</u>

I hope you had a wonderful extra long weekend. Here is an outline of their work with me for this week:

Math - Number sense: We are working on base ten blocks and expanded form.

**Phonics, spelling and reading**: This week we will be working on the graphemes **CK** making the sound /k/ and **SH making the sound /sh/**. Please see the homework practice sheets and spelling words going home today to help the students practice these phonics. Their assessment will be on Friday. If you have any questions regarding the home practice sheets, please reach out to us.

**Social studies**: We continue looking at different cultures and also traditions in Canada this week.

**Bible**: This week we start our new unit on Intertestamentary time. Tomorrow I will assess their Bible memory verses for the month of October. Most of the students know it really well. Please help them at home to learn the verse off by heart. Memorizing Bible verses is a wonderful way to prepare and equip us to share God's truth with others and to worship God. Here is our verse for this month: *"Sing to the Lord a new song, for He has done marvelous things; His right hand and His holy* 

arm have worked salvation for him." - Psalm 98:1-

**Library**: We have library tomorrow. They are allowed to borrow 2 library books at a time. If they return their books tomorrow, they can either renew it or get 2 new books. - **Review and Assessments**: Despite it being a short week, we successfully fit in plenty of reviews and assessments, ensuring everyone stayed on track with their learning.
- Edvance Conference: A special highlight for me was gathering with other Christian school teachers at the Edvance conference. It was a wonderful time of worship, being challenged in our thinking, and coming home with new strategies to implement in our classrooms.

**Language** - In reading we will continue to work on summarizing. In writing we will continue to work on narrative writing, working specifically on organizing our writing. We will also work on our writing through our gratitude wall display. In grammar we will continue to look at the parts of speech and will begin to use mentor sentences as a way of review. In fluency we will continue to apply a variety of different reading strategies to our shared reading of the "Pumpkins" text, focusing on the etymology of words in the text, how we can connect the text to our experiences, and our comprehension of the text. In spelling our next test will be on Nov. 11th. Through our morning meetings we are also working on phoneme awareness, phonics, vocabulary expansion, Watch your child's agenda for nightly spelling practice activities.
