And more recently, we have moved locations and grown in diversity of the families and students we serve.

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

God's faithfulness, what a gift. LCS, what a gift. We should celebrate!




















Thank You

THE ADDITION OF THE GYM TO THE ORIGINAL SCHOOL BUILDING

One of the greatest blessings to LCS was the addition and renovation of the original building. Imagine having a classroom, on a wintry day, after lunch, full of students pushing aside desks to get space to do jumping jacks, running on the spot, stretches etc. All the post lunch flatulence made the room very pungent!

Also, imagine pushing the weather envelope to do the same, but outside!

I know that the gym was finished almost 25 years ago because my husband Andy and my wedding reception was the first official event there on July 14th, 2000. The painting ladies, Mary Slotegraaf, Yoka Koersen, Helen Greydanus, Trudy Wilting (Anyone I forgot?) worked SO HARD to make sure it was ready on time! Also, the Willing Workers, who went on to cook for many more subsequent events, served us a wonderful meal!

Following that, our gym was used as a wonderful venue, not just for Phys Ed but for school chapels, Grandparent's Day (always a very special day!), Christmas Programs, Graduation, School Plays and so much more!

GRADE 3/4 CLASS TRIP MEMORIES

One memorable trip from Grade 3 and 4, was when we attended a free noon hour concert at Roy Thomson Hall to watch Johnathan Oldengarm perform. After the concert, I had arranged for us to eat our lunches in a classroom at the historic St. Andrew's Presbyterian Church across the street.

Upon my original request, some weeks earlier, the church directors had been baffled by the need of a group of rural kids to have a "picnic spot" in downtown Toronto! But they did graciously allow us to eat there and use their facilities.

Our ultimate destination was St. James Cathedral, a kilometer down King Street. The students loved the walk past all the "temples of mammon", bank head offices. The exteriors are done in rose, white and black quartz, exactly what some of us had been studying in Science!

We went to visit St. James upon invitation of Jonathan. He was practicing there for an upcoming concert. Because of his

kindness, my students were able to visit a beautiful historic church and the 1863 organ within it!

Another cross Toronto walk started with an educational visit to the beautiful Ontario Legislature. After our lunch there, we did a 2 km walk to Kensington Market. Of course a number of our students were wearing their Orange Holland World Cup Soccer t-shirts. The cafe patios were open and the Portuguese gentlemen were watching a game on the TV. When they saw the group of orange t-shirts, they loved it and we shared some humorous rivalrv!

The cap on that day was going to the souvenir shops on Spadina Avenue!

I loved these trips because they educated not only my students, but their accompanying parents as well! And I always debriefed later about how the big city can be such a great place!

The class trips we took to the Big Smoke - Toronto - are among the best we have ever had! One

trip we sailed in Toronto Harbour on a Tall Ship. One trip we did history at Black Creek Pioneer Village. One trip we wrote letters on old fashioned paper at Toronto's First Post Office As a wrap up of our study of Ancient Egypt, we went to the Royal Ontario Museum.

TEACHING MEMORIES

Some of my best memories of teaching at LCS were the nonclassroom experiences. 
